Crocodile fossil dig in the scenic and rugged North Dakota badlands near Buffalo Gap

A sixty million-year-old fossil site containing crocodile, champsosaur (crocodile-like animal), turtle, and fish have recently been discovered in the beautiful and rugged badlands near Buffalo Gap, North Dakota. The North Dakota Geological Survey in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service - Dakota Prairie Grasslands, will participate in scientific, professionally-conducted, fossil excavations at this site in June, 2011. Public participation is invited.
